

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Background: Macrocytic anemia is the most common anemia in HIV-infected patients receiving zidovudine, and is closely related to folate and vitamin B12 deficiencies. Homocysteine >10 μmol/L and increased MMA (methylmalonic acid) levels >24.8 ng/mL indicate high/low folate and vitamin B12 deficiencies. Furthermore, MTHFR (Methylene-tetrahydrofolate-reductase) plays an essential role in the transmethylation of homocysteine to methionine and is related to DNA synthesis. The MTHFR C665T gene polymorphism decreases the activity of MTHFR, which culminates in homocysteinemia. Therefore, this case-control aims to assess the role of the MTHFR C665T gene polymorphism on the risk of macrocytic anemia among HIV-infected individuals receiving zidovudine.

Methods: This study was conducted using an unmatched case-control design and the participants were HIV-infected adults aged 20 to 59 years old, receiving zidovudine for four weeks and above. A sample of 232 patients was divided into case group with macrocytic anemia and the control having no anemia. Multivariate logistic regression analysis was then implemented to determine the risk factors. **Results:** The results showed that there was a significant difference in the number of female and male patients namely 51.3% and 48.7%, respectively, with p< 0.001. Moreover, the mean age of the cases and control group was 41.9 ± 9.4 and 36.2 ± 8.3 . Regarding education, there were significant differences between subjects with low and high education 47.8% vs 52.2% with p<0.001. The majority of patients or 90.95% had taken AZT for more than 6 months. The logistic regression analysis test results showed that sex, age, education level, duration of AZT use, and homocysteine levels were predictors of macrocytic anemia with p<0.05, while MTHFR C665T gene polymorphism and MMA levels were not risk factors.

Conclusion: MTHFR C665T gene polymorphism does not contribute to the incidence of macrocytic anemia among HIV-infected individuals receiving zidovudine.

Introduction

Azido thymidine (AZT) or zidovudine is a nucleoside reverse transcriptase inhibitor (NRTIs) recommended by WHO and has become the primary option in HIV/AIDS therapy since 1990. The regulation of Indonesian Ministry of Health No. 87 of 2014 on Antiretroviral Treatment Guidelines includes AZT-containing regimen as the first-line alternative therapy for HIV/AIDS. Considering the guidelines, AZT-containing regimen has been widely used in Indonesia. However, long-term therapy is reportedly associated with macrocytic anemia, which is related to vitamin B12 and folate deficiency. Among PLWHA, certain HAART regimens, specifically nucleoside reverse transcriptase inhibitors such as AZT/zidovudine, stavudine (d4T), and 3TC are related to macrocytosis. Zidovudine is a thymidine analog that causes macrocytic anemia by interfering with DNA synthesis. The accumulation in cells increases intracellular reactive oxygen

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species (ROS) and mitochondrial tox 52 y, 5 including erythrocyte damage. 6 In addition, macrocytic anemia is linked to a lack of vitamin B12 57 d folate. 7 Methylene-tetrahydrofolate-reductase (MTHFR) gene polymorphism is a genetic factor associated with folate and vitamin B12 levels. 8 In the genetic variation, MTHFR C665T gene polymorphism incidence ranges from 24% to 53% and is affected by ethnicity and geography. 9 It affects thermolability, which culminates in a 50% reduction of MTHFR enzyme activity. 10 This decline leads to 37 eased plasma homocysteine (Hcy) levels, called hyperhomocysteinemia. 11 Hyperhomocysteine indicates folate and vitamin B12 deficiency and the MTHFR C665T gene polymorphism. The increased level of methylmalonic acid (MMA) is 52 nore specific parameter for vitamin B12 insufficiency. The red blood cell differentiation requires adequate quantities of vitamin B12 and folate. 12

Several factors have been found to cause the occurrence of macrocytic anemia.¹³ The authors have not found any studies evaluating the function of genetic variables, specifically in relation to the significance of the MTHFR gene variant C665T in the function of macrocytic anemia among HIV-infected patients receiving AZT-containing regimen therapy. Therefore, this study aims to investigate the effect of the MTHFR C665T gene polymorphism on the risk of macrocytic anemia among HIV-infected individuals receiving zidovudine. According to various previous studies, polymorphisms affect macrocytic anemia, but there are currently no reports on patients with HIV/AIDS receiving AZT.

Methods

This study was conducted using an observational analytic method with an unmatched case-control design. The subjects were outpatients of twelve rural and urban public health service facilities with a specific clinic for HIV in Central Java Province, Indonesia. They were selected based on medical treatment namely AZT-containing regimen and laboratory test 21 llts comprising Hemoglobin (Hb), and MCV. Furthermore, demographic data 33 luding sex, age, marital status, and sexual orientation, as well as me 53 all history and clinical data on admission were collected from medical records, interviews, and laboratory results. The sample s 55 was calculated using a formula which suggested a minimum number of 106 subjects in each group. The consecutive sampling method was implemented to select the potential subjects of the case and control groups.

The inclusion criteria for the subjects as cases were adds (aged 20 to 59 years), receiving treatment regimens containing zidovudine for 4 weeks and above, Hb levels <12 g/dL for women and <13 g/dL for men, not currently pregnant, MCV values >96 fL, and Javanese ethnic. The inclusion criteria of subjects as controls were adults (aged 20 to 59 years), receiving treatment regimens containing zidovudine for 4 weeks and above, Hb levels ≥12 g/dL for women and ≥13 g/dL for men, not currently pregnant, and Javanese ethnic. Determination of the criteria for the duration of AZT use for 4 weeks was based on previous studies. ¹⁴ The exclusion criteria were alcoholism, use of drugs including anticonvulsants and chemotherapy, hypothyroidism, hepatic cirrhosis and alcoholic hepatitis, hemodialysis, myelodysplasia syndrome, aplastic anemia, chronic kidney disease, history of GIT surgery/gastrectomy, medication non-adherence, and unwilling to be a respondent.

Measurement of Macrocytic Anemia

Hb levels were examined by cyanide-free Hb spectrophotometry method. The data were categorized based on the cut off anemia value¹⁵ into anemia Hb level <12 and <13 mg/dL for women and men, respectively, or non anemia. The Mean Corpuscular Volume (MCV) and Hb were automatically calculated using the Automatic Hematology Analyzer Sysmex XN-1000. MCV values were categorized into¹⁶ >96 fL (Macrocytosis) or 96 fL (Non macrocytosis). The homocysteine and MMA serum level were analyzed using the ELISA method. Homocysteine data were categorized according to the cut off value^{17,18} to be >10 mol/L or \leq .10 mol/L, while MMA was categorized based on the cut off being >24.8 ng/mL or 24.8 ng/mL.

Assessing Polymorphism MTHFR C655T Gene

Single Nucleotide Polymorphism (SNPs) is characterized by substitution of nucleotide base cytosine (C) to thymine (T) in the 665th c the DNA sequence of the MTHFR gene. Identification of the polymorphism was evaluated using the technique of Polymerase Chain Reaction-Restriction pragment Length of Polymorphism (PCR-RFLP). Data were categorized into yes (C665C) or not (C665T, T665T). The MTHFR gene was amplified using the ProFlex PCR machine

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with a total volume of 25 μL. Each tube consisted of 2 μL of DNA template, 8.9 μL dH2O, 12.5 μL Go Tag Green Master Mix, 2 μL primer forward and reverse with a concentration of 10 μM.

Statistical Analysis



Multivariate logistic regression tests were performed to determine the risk factors of macrocytic anemia among H infected patients receiving zidovudine therapy. The odds ratio (OR) was determined by on the exp (B) value of the logistic regression analysis with 95% confidence interval (95% CI), while P value of < 0.05 was considered statistically significant. Data were analyzed using International Business Machines (IBM) Statistical Package for the Social Sciences (SPSS) Statistics 23.

Ethics



The objectives were explained to the participants and written consent was taken before the interviate, also, confidentiality and privacy were kept properly. This study corresponded to the Helsinki Declaration and was approved by the Health Research Ethics Committee, School of Medicine, Diponegoro University, Semarang, Indonesia (Letter Number: 123/EC/ FK-RSDK/III/2018).



Results

A total of 232 patients participated and fulfilled the inclusion criteria 47 nd they were divided into the case and control groups with 116 each. The demographic and clinical characteristics are presented in Table 1. There was a significant difference in the number of female and male patients with p<0.001. The mean age of the cases and control groups was 41.9 ± 9.4 and 36.2 ± 8.3 , while the majority of patients or 43.5% were in the age range of 30–39 years. There was a significant difference in the number of subjects based on the education level with p<0.001. The duration of AZT consumption also showed a significant difference with p<0.001. Approximately 90.95% had taken the therapy for more than 6 months, while the duration for 9.05% was less.

The mean Hb level in the case and control groups was 11.2±1.3 g/dL and 14.3±1.4 g/dL, respectively. There was a significant difference in Hb levels between the two groups with p<0.001. The mean MCV of the case group was significantly higher than the control namely 11.02±7.3 vs 106.6±9.5, with p=<0.001. In addition, the mean of MMA between the two groups was significantly different with p<0.001. Based on the results, the number of MMA in both groups decreased. The mean level of homocysteine was found to be 11.54±7.09 µmol/L, and it was interpreted as homocysteinemia (>10 mol/L). The mean level in the case group at 10.13±5.51 mol/L was significantly lower than the control which is 12.95±8.17 mol/L (p<0.001).

Polymorphisms in the MTHFR C665T gene were discovered in 60 or 25.9% of patients. There were 33 (28.4%) of patients with polymorphisms in the case group and 27 (23.3%) in the control. The gene polymorphism was not statistically different between the two groups with p=0.45.

Based on the Restriction Fragment Length Polymorphism (RFLP) Polymerase Chain Reaction (PCR) examination of the MTHFR C665T gene, 172 (74.1%) were considered to have CC genotype specifically homozygote wild type, 54 (23.3%) had CT (heterozygote), and 6 (2.6%) had TT, the homozygote mutant type. The CC genotype and CT were found the case group with 83 (71.6%) and 32 (27.5%) while in the control with 89 (76.7%) and 22 (19.0%), respectively. The smallest number of genotypes, namely TT, was found in 1 subject or 0.9% of the case group and 5 or 4.3% in the control.

Table 2 shows the distribution of alleles in the case and control groups of HIV-infected patients. The frequency of C allele in the case group was 85.3% and the T allele was 14.77%. Meanwhile, in the control group, the frequency of the C and T allele was 86.2% and 13.8%, respectively.

As shown in Figure 1, lane L shows the ladder marker, lanes 116, 117, 122, and 125 homozygous wild type namely CC genotype revealed a product size of 294 bp. Lanes 118, 120, 121, 123, and 124 heterozygous namely CT genotype showed a product size of 294 bp, 168 bp, and 126 bp, while Lane 119 homozygous mutant or TT genotype showed 168 bp and 126 bp.

The different locations of the base cut identified using the restriction enzyme HinF1 indicated the existence of the MTHFR C665T gene polymorphism. The following observation of DNA sequencing was carried out on six subjects Pertiwi et al Dovepress

namely 3, 93, 97, 100, 148, and 174 to confirm the substitution of a single nucleotide base, C to T. Based on the results of PCR-RFLP, CC genotypes, CT, and TT were found in subjects number 97 and 148, 100 and 174, as well as 3 and 93, respectively. The sequencing results were in accordance with the PCR-RFLP result.

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


Figure 2 Results of DNA sequencing of the MTHFR C665T gene polymorphism.

The DNA sequencing results of the MTHFR C665T gene polymorphism are shown in Figure 2. A-1 arrows indicate forward nucleotide C sequences, A-2 indicate reverse nucleotide G sequences, B-1 arrows indicate CT nucleotide

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


Figure I PCR-RFLP product of the MTHFR C665t genotype which was digested with the HinFI enzyme.

forward sequences and B-2 arrows indicate GA reverse. Meanwhile, C-1 arrows indicate T nucleotide forward sequences and C-2 arrows indicate A reverse.

The logistic regression analysis results presented in Table 3 show several predictors of macrocytic anemia such as gender, age, education level, duration of AZT use, and homocysteine levels with p<0.05. In contrast, MTHFR C665T gene polymorphism and MMA levels were not found to be risk factors with p>0.05.

Discussion

Anemia in HIV-infected patients is normally caused by chronic disease or the use of HIV drugs such as zidovudine. Meanwhile, Vitamin B12 and folate insufficiency are the most common causes of macrocytic anemia. Moreover, zidovudine is the most common HIV medicine that causes macrocytic anemia. A rise in homocysteine and MMA levels in the blood can be used to determine the presence of these illnesses.²⁰ Anemia usually develops 4 to 12 weeks after starting zidovudine medication.¹⁴ After six months of treatment, there was a high prevalence of macrocytic anemia (80.6%).²¹

In most cases, hematological damage occurs within 3–6 months and is reversible. ²² Anemia was more frequent in females than males among HIV-infected patients who received zidovudine due to blood loss during menstruation and lack of iron consumption from pregnancy to delivery. ^{23,24} Adediran et al discovered that using thymidine analog treatment namely zidovudine, or stavudine was more related to macrocytosis in HIV patients than to the infection itself. ²⁵ Furthermore, disorders of erythrocyte nucleus maturation can cause delays in cell division causing cells to become larger, leading to macrocytosis. This condition can be caused by folate and vitamin B12 deficiency. ¹³ Vitamin B12 has two functions, first, it acts as a coenzyme for biochemical processes as methyl B12. Second, it acts as a cofactor for methionine synthase, which is responsible for the methylation of homocysteine into methionine using 5-methyltetrahydrofolate (MTHF/methyl THF) as a methyl donor. The second function is deoxyadenosyl B12 (Ado B12), which converts MMA to succinyl Co-A. When an individual experiences a vitamin B12 deficiency, the circulating MMA levels will rise. MMA is a biomarker that is frequently used to evaluate the functional status of B12 vitamin because it is more stable than serum B12 vitamin. Also, the concentration of MMA increases before B12 vitamin level declines in the blood. ²⁶ Homocysteine and MMA levels are measured to detect the existence of B12 vitamin insufficiency. When there is vitamin B12 deficiency, homocysteine and MMA levels will increase. ^{12,25,27,28}

MTHFR, or methylenetetrahydrofolate reductase, is responsible for folate distribution and increased plasma total homocysteine concentration. ^{29–31} The C665T gene polymorphism causes MTHFR to be thermolabile, decreasing enzyme activity, leading to lower 5-MTHF, vitamin B12, and folate levels, as well as increased homocysteine, and hypomethylation of genomic DNA. ^{28,31–33} This implies that hereditary and non-genetic variables affect macrocytic anemia together with other genetic factors such as genes encoding the enzymes methionine synthase (MS)/5-methyltetrahydrofolate-homocysteine methyltransferase (MTR) and methylene-tetrahydrofolate dehydrogenase (MTHFD1), which play roles in homocysteine and folate metabolic pathways, and other physical interactions. ³⁴ In addition, the enzyme cystathionine synthase (CBS), the transcobalamin 2 receptor (TCN2), and methionine synthase reductase, all together affect homocysteine metabolism (MTRR). ³⁵ Non-genetic variables such as folate level, riboflavin status, therapeutic effect, and age also contribute to the risk of MTHFR C665T gene polymorphism. ³⁶

Based on the results, the gene polymorphism did not play a role in the incidence of macrocytic anemia in HIV patients receiving AZT-containing regimen therapy. Previous studies discovered that the MTHFR C665T gene polymorphism is not significantly linked with anemia. However, it was strongly connected with folate and vitamin B12 insufficiency, indicating that genetics does not contribute significantly to the risk of anemia.³⁷ It was also reported that the MTHFR C665T gene polymorphism will cause MTHFR to become thermolabile and reduce the enzyme activity,

thereby decreasing 5-MTHF, vitamin B12 and folate levels as well as increasing serum homocysteine and genomic DNA hypomethylation. 8,32,33,38,39 A previous study stated that the gene polymorphism did not play a role in increasing homocysteine levels >10 mol/L. This might be due to the complex metabolic pathway of the homocysteine and the MTHFR enzyme which is only one of several enzymes involved in the pathway. 40

The deficiency of folate and vitamin B12 causes disturbances in the maturation of the erythrocyte nucleus that affects the delay in cell division leading to macrocytic anemia. ^{13,41} However, other studies also stated that macrocytic anemia in HIV-infected patients receiving zidovudine might indicate drug non-adherence. According to a previous report, ARV therapy can increase serum vitamin B12 levels in HIV-infected patients. ⁴² This is consistent with the results obtained in this study which showed that the MTHFR C665T gene polymorphism was not a strong contributing factor to the increase of macrocytic anemia risk.

Investigations on the role of the MTHFR C665T gene polymorphism in the incidence of macrocytic anemia among HIV-infected patients receiving zidovudine therapy are limited. In Indonesia, there is a cultural aspect which limits studies on this area of HIV. The results obtained provide a new perspective for further investigations on the causes of macrocytic anemia among HIV-infected patients receiving zidovudine, which in turn can serve as a guide in preventing future occurrences. In addition, the results present a new protocol for controlling macrocytic anemia, with hematological monitoring in the first 6 months of using zidovudine.

The limitation of this study was that the examination of Hb levels before and after the use of zidovudine was not performed. Vitamin B intake which might influence the incidence of macrocytic anemia was also not evaluated.

Conclusions

The MTHFR C665T gene polymorphism did not contribute to the incidence of macrocytic anemia among HIV-infected individuals receiving zidovudine. Polymorphism is related to ethnicity, therefore, its influence on macrocytic anemia might be different from one race to another. Further study on other ethnicity needs to be conducted to confirm this assumption. There is also a need to consider non-genetic factors that can affect homocysteine metabolic pathways such as vitamin B intake.
